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WHO WE ARE, WHAT WE DO

Founded in 1992 and housed at The City College of New York, the Dominican Studies Institute of the City University of New York (CUNY DSI) is the nation's first, university-based research institute devoted to the study of people of Dominican descent in the United States and other parts of the world.

CUNY DSI's mission is to produce and disseminate research and scholarship about Dominicans, and about the Dominican Republic. The Institute houses the Dominican Archives and the Dominican Library, the first and only institutions in the United States collecting primary and secondary source material about Dominicans. CUNY DSI is the locus for a community of scholars in the field of Dominican Studies. It is home to pioneering research projects, lectures, conferences, exhibitions, and a rigorous doctoral fellowship program in Dominican Studies.

THE DOMINICAN LIBRARY

The Library of the CUNY Dominican Studies Institute officially opened in 1994. It is a unique reference collection whose mission is to identify, acquire, organize, preserve and make available bibliographical sources documenting the Dominican experience in the United States and in the rest of the world. The Dominican Library houses approximately 6,000 books, 850 doctoral and master's degree dissertations; 13,000 newspaper clippings and journal articles, and 250 audio visual resources including film and music CDs.

THE DOMINICAN ARCHIVES

The Dominican Archives, established in 2002 with financial support from the New York State Archives Documentary Heritage Program, is a repository of archival materials that document the experience and contributions of Dominicans in the United States. Its mission is to identify, appraise, accession, process, preserve and provide access to archival materials that have historical research or other value. The Dominican Archives houses 73 collections, amounting to 1,200 cubic ft.

It is the first platform to make this kind of collection of sources available on the internet to the larger public.
