After that date, registration will be extended annually until the Department's next review is conducted.

Any program being replaced by the programs registered by notice of this letter will be removed from the Inventory of Registered Programs effective February 2, 2004. All students enrolled in programs that will be discontinued will need to have completed the programs or transferred to registered programs on or before the date of discontinuance.

New registration is required for any existing curriculum in which major changes are made that affect its title, focus, design, requirements for completion, or mode of delivery. Therefore, I ask that you contact this office prior to initiating a significant change in these programs.

Purpose

The proposed joint registration of the associate degree/baccalaureate degree program will provide Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC) students with the first two years of an articulated liberal arts transfer program leading to a baccalaureate degree in childhood education or bilingual childhood education at The City College of New York (CCNY). The program design allows a student to use the first two years to maximum benefit in preparing for the upper division teacher education program as well as the liberal arts major of their choice. All education majors are required to complete a liberal arts or sciences comajor as well as the professional preparation in education.

The proposed program provides increased opportunities for BMCC's diverse student population to enter the teaching profession. By increasing opportunities and easing the transition from BMCC to CCNY, the program should enlarge the pool of teachers available to serve the schools in the City of New York.

The jointly registered program is designed to provide students with:

- A firm foundation in the liberal arts through coursework in the arts, English, modern language, mathematics, laboratory science, history, the social sciences, and speech;
- b. Courses in a liberal arts major that are fully articulated with the course offerings and degree requirements in CCNY;
- c. An introduction to the field of education through the offering of two equivalent CCNY courses in education: EDU 20600/01, (Observing children and their Development/Fieldwork) and EDUC 22100/01 (Urban Schools in a Diverse Society/Fieldwork).
- d. Appropriate student support services including relevant academic advisement, counseling and tutoring.

The proposed joint program will require BMCC students to complete a minimum of 52 credit hours in liberal arts, including the arts, English, history, mathematics, science and speech as well as professionally related education courses (8 credits childhood, 4 credits Bilingual Childhood Education).

2. Need

In recent years, the increasing demand for teachers has become critical. It is estimated that the New York City school system will need nearly 20,000 new teachers in the next decade.

The proposed dual/joint registration program in teacher education can help reverse the trends reflected in recent teacher enrollment data by easing the transition of community college students into teacher education programs, and by recruiting students who might not have considered teacher education. In addition, since much of New York's increases in minority student enrollment have occurred in two-year institutions, it is logical to look to the community colleges for the development of a process by which more minority students can make a smooth transition from the community to senior college. The proposed dual/joint program in teacher education is intended to attract and support students who, under current circumstances and requirements, might not have realistic access to teacher education at the four-year college.

The program will be open to all students who have been admitted to BMCC. It is expected that this program will draw students from a wide variety of backgrounds and interests. In an effort to provide expanded career opportunities for community college students, this cooperative program is expected to provide opportunities for students who may not have easily qualified for teacher education.

In summary, there is a need to recruit students to offset the projected teacher shortage, and the proposed jointly registered program will provide increased access and incentives for BMCC's diverse student population to become future educators.

3. Proposed Curriculum Overview

BMCC's existing Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree program, with modification, provides the necessary foundation and transition for students wishing to continue their studies in education. Since the students are to be simultaneously admitted to the community and senior colleges, those who satisfactorily complete their first two years of study at BMCC and who meet the requirements to be admitted as an education major are assured of uninterrupted, articulated continuance at CCNY towards the bachelors degree with an education major.

The program has been structured to allow a student to use the first two years to maximum benefit in preparing for the upper division in childhood teacher education. Students will complete a core of courses in the liberal arts and sciences which satisfies the requirement for the Associate in Arts degree at BMCC. These core courses, with appropriate academic advisement, will satisfy most of the general education core requirements for baccalaureate (B.S.Ed.) degree candidates at CCNY.

Students will be advised to choose their liberal arts and elective course credits to satisfy BMCC requirements. Additionally, BMCC will offer two professional courses in Childhood Education, EDU 206/01 & EDU 22100/01, totaling 8 credits. Students in Bilingual Childhood Education will earn 4 credits in one professional education course – EDU 20600/01.

BMCC and CCNY will establish a procedure for early and continuous advisement to assure that students are aware of the course of study that is required for the transition to the four-year program. BMCC will develop advisement literature for distribution to entering freshmen. This literature will be given to students during their initial academic advisement prior to registration.

When a student enters the third year of the program, advisement will be directed by the designated education faculty advisor at CCNY. Advisement in the junior and senior years will focus on planning schedules, allowing for timely acquisition of appropriate credits and providing guidance and academic support as needed in preparation for the NYS certification examination.

In summary, a student completing the jointly registered program will obtain the associate in arts (A.A.) degree, a baccalaureate (B.S.Ed.) degree, and be eligible for an initial teaching certificate.

4. Program Admission

BMCC admits students in accordance with the admissions policy established by the University's Board of Trustees. Under this policy, any applicant who holds a high school diploma, or the equivalent, and is a resident of New York City or State, is eligible for admission to an undergraduate degree program.

In addition to completing the associate degree requirements at BMCC, students entering the education major in childhood and bilingual childhood education must satisfy each of the following before matriculating in the course sequence at CCNY:

- 1. A minimum overall cumulative average (GPA) of 2.5 is required
- 2. Pass the School of Education Admissions Test (S.E.A.T.)
- 3. Interview with a CCNY School of Education faculty advisor in major field.

Prospective childhood and bilingual childhood teachers (pre K-6) may take either a co-major in a content discipline (English, history, political science, etc.) or one of the inter-disciplinary majors (social studies, language and literature, biology, chemistry, etc.) offered in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Students completing the BMCC degree requirements and the above cited CCNY requirements are guaranteed admission to the CCNY program and given full transfer credit.

Students

Identity

The proposed program is designed to attract and interest the general student population enrolled in liberal arts programs of study. It will attract those who are seeking an alternative to the general associate in arts degree, and those who wish to focus on education as a major. This dual/joint program initiative will provide expanded opportunities for students to move into teaching careers. It is expected that this program will be of interest to many minority students who are looking for career opportunities in education.

BMCC enrollment in fall 2002 was approximately 18,000 (17,913), which includes a matriculated liberal arts enrollment of nearly 4500 (4489) students. During the past five years, liberal arts enrollment figures have increased. More women than men are enrolled in the college (female = 63%, male = 37%) and there is a significantly larger enrollment of women than men in the liberal arts program (female = 64%, male = 36%).

BMCC attracts students from the entire city of New York. BMCC's student body reflects the liversity of New York with 35% African Americans, 11% Asian and 28% Hispanic students and immigrants from many nations. Moreover, among liberal arts majors, this is also true: 32% African Americans, 9% Asians, and 34% Hispanics, etc. We expect that the enrollment in the new jointly registered program will reflect the diversity of our overall student population.

Recruitment

BMCC offers residents of New York City and New York State an opportunity for an educational experience of good quality at minimal cost. It is anticipated that recruitment practices conducted by BMCC's Office of Admissions will be supplemented by a separate promotional campaign for the proposed dual/joint degree program in teacher education.

Based on prior experience with new program initiatives, BMCC will be able to accommodate all students interested in this proposed dual/joint program leading to the B.S. in Education degree.

The Dean of the School of Education at CCNY has indicated that students enrolled in the jointly registered program leading to teacher certification would be assured a place in the senior institution's teacher education sequence, providing they meet the admissions requirements for the childhood or bilingual childhood education major as outlined below:

- 1. Pass the School of Education Admissions Test (S.E.A.T).
- 2. A minimum G.P.A. of 2.5.
- 3. Interview with a CCNY School of Education faculty advisor in major field.

Furthermore, financial aid from the Empire State Challenger Scholarship and the Teacher Opportunity Corps programs will be available to eligible students from the time they enroll at the community college through baccalaureate degree completion.

Academic Advisement

Each student entering the program will first be advised by faculty members and the Office of Academic Advisement and Transfer from BMCC in consultation with faculty at CCNY. The School of Education Office of Student Services at City College is also available to students who need assistance with academic or career decisions related to this program.

In this program, student support services workshops at BMCC will focus on:

- 1. Making the transition to the four-year program
- 2. Choosing a major and a co-major
- 3. Identifying peer support groups
- 4. Understanding the expectations of an employer.

Guest speakers from CCNY and supervising teachers from its affiliated schools will be invited to participate in these workshops. When the students have completed their A.A. degree and proceed to studies at CCNY, faculty members at CCNY will be their primary academic advisors. There is also a well-staffed and effective Office of Student Services in the School of Education at CCNY to assist students with academic procedures.

Demand

It is expected that the initial enrollment for the proposed joint program in teacher education will be 50. Traditionally, 80% of the students in a newly approved program migrate over from currently existing programs. Attrition and graduation combined are estimated at approximately 30%. A goal of approximately 25 new students will ensure continuity of the program but the number could be higher.

6. Resources

Faculty and Staff

BMCC and CCNY have qualified faculty to teach all of the courses in the proposed program. The participating departments anticipate that no new full-time faculty will be required to support the program initiative. It is possible, however, that as the new jointly registered program grows in popularity, additional faculty will be hired to teach added course sections.

Facilities

Appropriate facilities and equipment presently exist for the proposed program. The A. Philip Randolph Library at BMCC will fulfill the primary role for the first two years and the Morris Raphael Cohen Library at CCNY will be available to students for all four years and will be the primary source of materials for the final two years of the program. The CUNY PLUS integrated library system will enable students to access pertinent library collections within the CUNY system.

Expenditures

No new expenditures except for those normally encountered in adding lecture sections to accommodate additional students are required. As the program grows, additional faculty will be hired in high demand areas.

7. Program Evaluation

BMCC and CCNY are accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. As part of the accreditation process, the colleges conduct self evaluations and are periodically visited by outside evaluators.

Each college maintains an extensive database containing student performance, persistence, and other standard academic measures. These databases enable each college's Office of Institutional Research to conduct assessments of students' academic achievements, including program completion. In addition, CUNY's Office of Institutional Research and Analysis has recently developed a university-wide Institutional Research Database (IRDB) that permits the tracking of students across colleges for outcomes reporting. Using the IRDB, the Institutional Research Offices at BMCC and CCNY will track student movement through the two institutions. The enrollment and performance data will be used in order to make formal evaluations and recommendations for program improvement.
