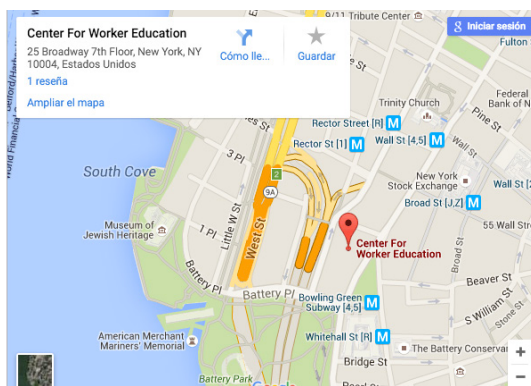

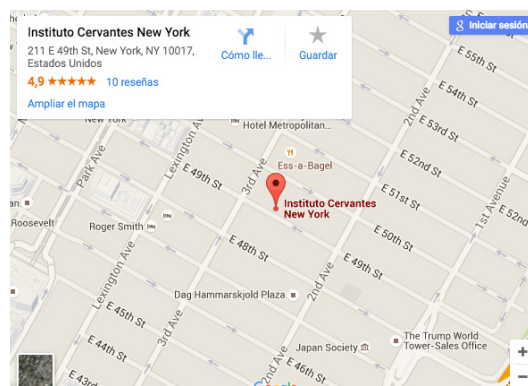

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

The advent and consolidation of new technologies and social movements, combined with the challenges posed by climate change and population displacement, have put the concept of democracy to the test—both locally and globally. That is to say, local socio-cultural phenomena are now interwoven with global trends and changes in the globalized market for cultural capital (e.g., social media), the market economy, and transnational politics.

As a byproduct of modernity, modern democracies developed alongside scientific narratives and social science methodologies aimed at fostering merit-based systems of social mobility—regulated by the market and driven by innovation. However, the emergence of the global attention economy and the crisis surrounding the paradigm of verifiable truth now pose existential threats to the various forms of democracy around the world.

The International Conference on “Historical Links between Spain and the Americas” explores the rich historical interaction between Spain and the Americas and examines how these ties have shaped contemporary challenges in this transatlantic region. Drawing on diverse approaches in the humanities, social sciences, and emerging disciplines such as climate change, immigration, and ecocriticism, the conference seeks to analyze present-day dynamics and their implications for the future of democracy in the West.

This 10th edition features sixty-five participants representing more than forty institutions from Spain and the Americas. The presentations are organized into fourteen panels, delivered in a hyflex format (in-person and online). Each panel offers transversal perspectives on the theme “Historical Links between Spain and the Americas.”

Of special interest in this edition is the keynote event featuring Professor David Jeruzalmi, who will present his research on “Molecular Machines.” Also notable is the presence of world-renowned philosopher and best-selling author Lou Marinoff, along with journalist Paco Reyero and Distinguished Professor José Miguel Martínez Torrejón, all contributing to a well-rounded and thought-provoking program.

SEEING THE INVISIBLE: MOLECULAR MACHINES AT WORK

David Jeruzalmi, Professor of Chemistry and Biochemistry (CCNY | CUNY)

David Jeruzalmi is a Professor of Chemistry and Biochemistry at The City College of New York (CCNY). He earned his Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from the University of Cincinnati in 1987 and holds a Ph.D. in Molecular Biophysics and Biochemistry from Yale University. Professor Jeruzalmi's research focuses on the structural and biochemical mechanisms underlying DNA replication and repair. His laboratory employs X-ray crystallography and electron microscopy techniques to investigate these essential biological processes. In addition to his research, Professor Jeruzalmi teaches at CCNY and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. He also directs the Biochemistry, Biophysics, and Biodesign (B3) Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program and co-directs the Opportunities in Research and Creative Arts (ORCA) at CCNY; both programs provide undergraduate students with summer research opportunities.

Dr. Jeruzalmi has published numerous peer-reviewed articles in prestigious scientific journals, including *Nature*, *Science*, *Cell*, *Nucleic Acids Research*, *eLife*, and the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*. His research has been continuously supported by grants from major funding agencies, including the National Institutes of Health and the National Science Foundation, reflecting the significance and impact of his work.



Ranajeet Ghose is a Professor of Chemistry and Biochemistry at the City College of New York and a member of the PhD programs in Biochemistry, Chemistry, and Physics at the Graduate Center of CUNY. He received his PhD from Yale University and has been at the City College since 2002. The research in his group involves the use of a variety of experimental and computational approaches to study the structure, dynamics and interactions of important cellular signaling molecules called kinases.

FERNANDO SOR'S HISTORICAL, CULTURAL AND POLITICAL LINKS WITH THE AMERICAS

Lou Marinoff, Professor of Philosophy (CCNY | CUNY)

This talk will explore Fernando Sor's life and his connections with the Americas through three phases, including his service to the American Consul in Málaga, his time in London teaching future liberators, and the legacy of his work through Andrés Segovia. The talk will be based on Lou Marinoff's research and his book *Fernando: Beethoven of the Guitar*.



Lou Marinoff, a Commonwealth Scholar originally from Canada, is Professor of Philosophy at The City College of New York, an internationally bestselling author, and founding president of the American Philosophical Practitioners Association. His scholarly interests include Asian Philosophy, Philosophy of AI, Ethics, and Decision Theory. He is best-known for popular books on philosophy for everyday life, including *Plato Not Prozac*, published in twenty-seven languages. Lou has done book and media tours throughout the Americas, and world-wide. A lifelong student and former teacher of classical guitar, he has an affinity for the music of Fernando Sor. This led to a 12-year research and writing project that culminated with the 2021 publication of *Fernando: Beethoven of the Guitar*, a trilogy of historical fiction. In 2024 *Fernando* was re-released in one complete volume. Extracts from this oeuvre, and associated research, form the basis of this talk.

José Miguel Martínez Torrejón, licenciado por la Universidad Autónoma de Barcelona y doctor por la de California (Santa Bárbara) es Distinguished Professor en la City University of New York. Definidos de modo amplio, sus trabajos de investigación se dedican a observar la palabra y su manipulación, aplicando el análisis filológico y retórico al estudio de la historia de las ideas y los usos políticos de la literatura. Entiende y practica los estudios ibéricos como un todo donde se entreteje lo español, portugués y latinoamericano. Recientemente ha publicado la *Miscelânea sebástica da Ajuda* (donde se incluye la *Lamentable pérdida* de Jerónimo Corte-Real), *Los pre-textos de «La Florida del Inca»* y su nueva edición de la *Brevisima relación* del padre Las Casas (Cátedra, 2023), y sigue trabajando en su monografía sobre *Don Sebastián vivo y muerto*.

Francisco Paco Reyero (Sevilla, 1971) ha sido corresponsal en el Oeste americano y ha cubierto para radio, prensa y televisión la campaña de electoral de 2016 (publicó el libro *Trump: El León del Circo*) y las elecciones presidenciales de 2020 y 2024. Desde hace 5 temporadas presenta *Atlantic Express*, un novedoso formato radiofónico semanal difundido por RNE en el que indaga sobre la relación histórica de España y Estados Unidos.
