Commencement Speaker

Savion Utshudi



Savion Utshudi is a Junior at A. Philip Randolph Campus High School (APRCHS) and part of the APRCHS: CCNY Teacher Pipeline Project, which seeks to address the shortage of teachers recruited from, and retained by, New York City's public schools.

As a child, Savion dreamed of becoming a professional football player. However, hanging out with the wrong group of people led him into aggressive arguments with his mother. He began to realize that he needed to figure out who he wanted to be and gain a different

perspective on the things that were happening around the world to Black individuals. Mr. Markland Walker, a teacher and father figure in school, had a profound impact on Savion. It made him want to make sure every Black and Brown kid in New York City Public Schools had someone they could feel comfortable talking to—about their feelings, who they were, as individuals, and what they might be struggling with. If they were going through something important, he knew first-hand that a teacher could make a profound difference, helping them fix what was happening in their lives.

Over time, Savion realized that he too, as a young Black man, could make an impact on the youth in Black and Hispanic communities, and school became the most important thing for him. Savion is deeply grateful to Mr. Walker, an APRCHS teacher, for pushing him to his limit, and that is what he wants to do: to teach others, to push them to their limits, and to show them how much power they can have if they truly believe in themselves. He also wants to encourage others to do good in life, particularly for young Black males and females who need that father figure in school to be able to accomplish their goals and dreams to the fullest possible extent.

Retiring Faculty & Staff

Laura Rader



Professor Laura Rader has been a faculty member at The City College of New York for 20 years. She has served in many roles, such as Program Director, Department Chair and Adjunct Faculty for summer courses. She has had the honor of teaching all undergraduate and graduate courses offered in the Special Education program.

Over the years, Professor Rader has accomplished many things for the Special Education program. As Program Director, in addition to continually revising courses and program infrastructure, she oversaw program growth that more than doubled

the size of the program. She also wrote the original advanced certificate program for certified teachers and collaborated with Early Childhood faculty to develop a joint program. Her passion for early intervention shined in this collaboration, as she developed and taught this new course in an online format, earning rave reviews. Finally, she was part of the team that led the Special Education program in its first unconditionally accredited Specialized Professional Association report with The Council for Exceptional Children during the NCATE accreditation process.

She excels at classroom teaching and online courses, and developed an online structure for learning well before the need during the COVID Pandemic. Positive student evaluations and personal responses regarding exceptional teaching skills have been the theme during her years of teaching with the college. Perhaps her prior experiences helped shape her success here at The City College of New York. Visually impaired since birth, Professor Rader is no stranger to understanding the complexities of special education from both a personal and professional level. Her passion has been sharing ideas for inclusive practices for all individuals with disabilities. Additionally, her teachings have always centered on the what, how, and why of principles for inclusive practices with the hopes of reducing stigmas that have remained in society for centuries.

She attended the University of Connecticut, graduating in 3.5 years with a degree in Speech/Language Pathology. She worked as a substitute teacher and decided Special Education would use everything she had already learned. She went on to earn an M.Ed. with a concentration in Learning Disabilities and Behavioral Disorders from The University of Hartford. She became certified in special education from preschool through high school, and she also earned school administration certification (certifications she maintains active today).

Retiring Faculty & Staff

Laura Rader

Professor Rader worked in an urban public school system for 11 years as a classroom teacher, Instructional Assistant (IA-Assistant Principal), and then as interim Director of Pupil Personnel for the district. She also worked with the Department of Education in Connecticut as part of the Beginning Educator Support Training (BEST) program. Further, she was a consultant for their alternate state assessment for students with severe cognitive disabilities. However, her thirst for more knowledge took her to Teachers College, Columbia University, and while working full-time and commuting from Connecticut to attend classes, she earned her Ed D. in 2003. Prior to her role as faculty with The City College of New York, she worked as faculty with The State University of New York.

Professor Rader has had a varied professional career. She has enjoyed being part of The City College of New York and looks forward to spending time with her son as he navigates college choices, her yorkie Winston, and bearded dragon Toby.



Retiring Faculty & Staff

Dr. Leonard Lewis



Dr. Leonard Lewis' venture into the field of education began when he entered a teaching certificate program at the College of Education in his home country of Guyana. After graduating in 1973, he taught at the elementary level for about three years before transferring to a community high school for another two years. Both schools were in the small village of Belladrum, located on the west coast of Berbice. Shortly after, in the fall of 1980, Dr. Lewis immigrated to the United States to complete a B.S. degree in educational media at Ohio University. That was followed with an M.A. degree in educational media. Upon

graduating, he began his foray into the US workforce at Dean Witter Reynolds and the MTA before returning to Ohio University to pursue a Ph.D. in instructional technology. Apart from the academic studies, the small group of students and faculty who hailed from the Caribbean region were immersed in campus activities organized by the Caribbean Scholars Association. Whether it was opposing the invasion of Grenada or celebrating International Day festivities, the Caribbean Scholars Association made its mark on the campus. Not surprising, this area of interest led Dr. Lewis to write his dissertation, entitled "Caribbean immigrants in higher education: A study of the relationship among their learning styles and strategies, achievement motivation, and academic performance." Students from several CUNY campuses were surveyed in this study.

In February of 1992, Dr. Lewis joined the City College School of Nursing as Director of its Learning Resource Center. The School of Nursing was housed in the Harris Hall building before its demise in 1997. After the final batch of nursing students completed their program in Spring 1997, Dr. Lewis joined the School of Education as the Director of the Learning & Technology Resource Center (LTRC). The current space occupied by the LTRC originally housed part of the School Psychology program; it was remodeled to accommodate the newly designed LTRC, which marked its official opening on March 18, 1998. The LTRC was primarily designed to support students preparing for their certification examinations. At that time, performance on the teacher certification examinations across all CUNY campuses was at an all-time low. Over time, and with diligent support systems and careful monitoring of course work, student performance improved drastically and eventually matched the passing rate at both the state and national levels.

Retiring Faculty & Staff

Dr. Leonard Lewis

Providing support for students preparing for their teacher certification examinations has held a special interest in Dr. Lewis' academic career. In 2002, he secured a New York City Department of Education grant of \$250,000 to offer programs to improve the performance of public school teachers on their teacher certification examinations. This was during the era when teachers were hired without being certified and later found themselves caught in a bind when the state mandated that all teachers obtain their initial certification to maintain their teaching positions.

Having served as both Chair and Co-chair of the Committee on Assessment, Dr. Lewis believes the School of Education has laid the foundation for continued success in its accreditation process. And while new challenges are being posed, the unit is making headway in implementing new changes necessary for responding to external demands that require compliance. Dr. Lewis says, "Every decade brings new challenges to education that necessitate a challenging response. However, I believe structures and systems are in place, and are being implemented, to support a successful accreditation visit."

As the advisor to the School of Education undergraduate club, Teachers for a Better Tomorrow, Dr. Lewis has tremendous respect for those students who, despite tight schedules and daunting deadlines, make time and create opportunities for engaging beyond the classroom. "I remain committed to expanding opportunities for students to continue networking among themselves and upon graduating and entering the workforce. I look forward to the time when we recognize and value our students as ambassadors to the world."

Honors Policies

UNDERGRADUATE GRADUATION HONORS

At graduation, there are three categories of honors for baccalaureate candidates.

- A degree Summa Cum Laude is granted to students whose average in all subjects is at least 3.8 ***
- A degree Magna Cum Laude is granted to students whose average in all subjects is at least 3.5 **
- A degree Cum Laude is granted to students whose average in all subjects is at least 3.2 *

For students admitted to the college prior to Fall 2014, the graduation honors policy is as follows:

In the computation of graduation honors, all college work taken by students at institutions other than the City College is taken into account even if some of the work is not transferred.

Students must be eligible for honors based exclusively on their City College work, and based on the combined average of their City College work and all work completed at other institutions.

A student may not obtain a higher honor (i.e., Magna Cum Laude instead of Cum Laude) than their City College index indicates. Thus, if a student achieves a 3.3 index at the City College and has a combined index of 3.5, the honor Cum Laude is awarded.

Second degree students are not eligible for graduation honors.

For students admitted to the college in Fall 2014 and after, the graduation honors policy is as follows:

A student must complete a minimum of 50 credits at City College to be eligible for Latin honors. Only coursework completed at City College is taken into account in the computation of graduation honors.

Second degree students are not eligible for graduation honors.

College honors for baccalaureate degrees are conferred on graduating seniors who meet standards approved by the Academic Senate. Graduation honors are computed on the basis of all college level work taken by students, including work taken at institutions other than City College. Determination of these honors is final when all work is complete.

GRADUATE GRADUATION HONORS

The School of Education graduation honors are awarded to candidates for Master's degrees and advanced certificates who have a grade point average of 3.7 or higher with no grade below B, and who have exhibited high personal and professional qualities. Determination of these honors is final when all work is completed.

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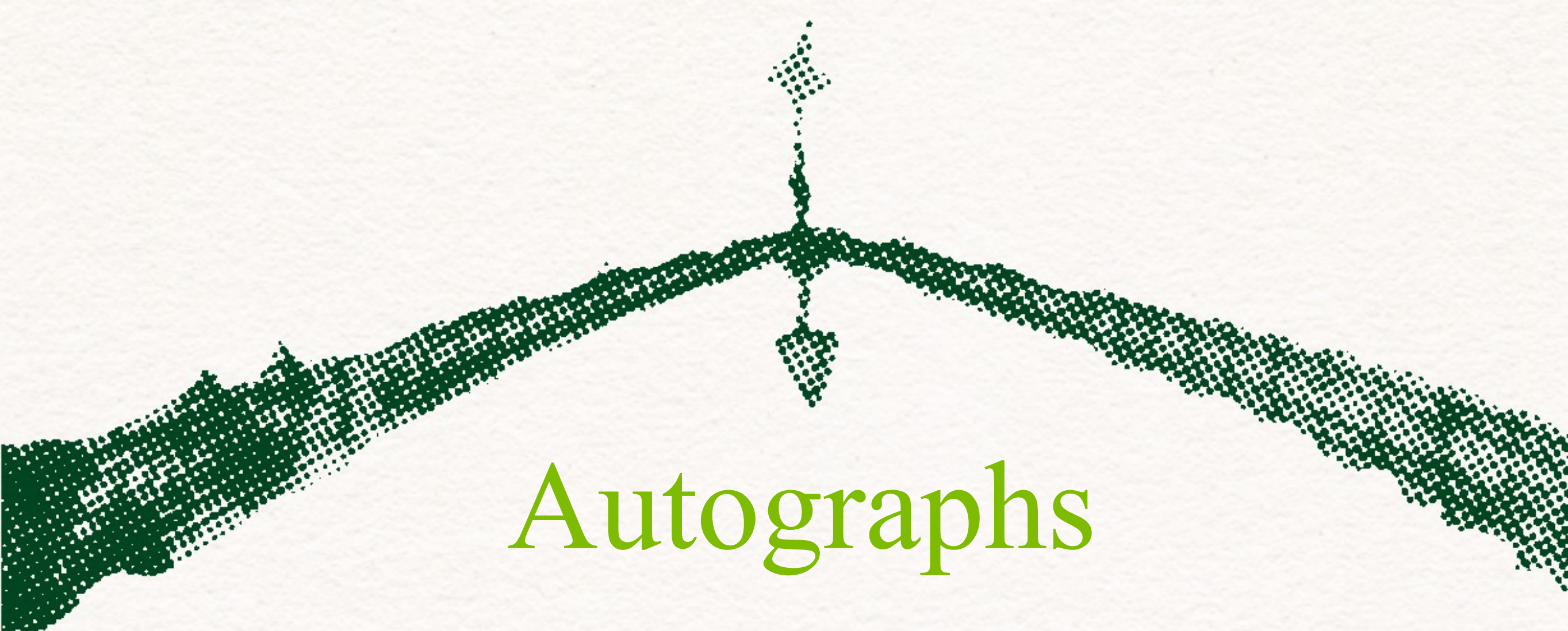
